TOWN COUNCIL SUCCESS STORIES

Once again, this has been a very busy and productive year, with continued campaigning by the Town Council for improved local healthcare provision, further improvements to the locality for the benefit of residents and large-scale projects progressing well. As always, there is too much to mention within a single report, however, during the past year there have, as always, been a number of successes that are definitely worthy of highlighting:

CONTINUING THE CAMPAIGN TRAIL!

Addressing Discrimination in Healthcare Provision

The Council has continued to lead the campaign to improve the local healthcare infrastructure in New Romney and across the Romney Marsh. In October, its healthcare representative, Councillor Rolfe, joined local MP – Damian Collins in Westminster for a meeting with the Minister for Health & Social Care— Stephen Barclay MP. The aim of the meeting was to discuss local ambulance response times and discuss ongoing issues in relation to local healthcare provision in the area – in particular the lack of local GP's – which is a country-wide problem. Following the meeting, Councillor Rolfe drafted a report that assessed "Discrimination in Healthcare Provision in Rural and Coastal areas"

and this was submitted to our MP and to the Minister to highlight the problems in these geographically vulnerable areas.

The South Kent Coast Clinical Commissioning Group ('CCG') continues to progress the development of a new health hub in the Town. Meetings have taken place with KCC officers and a range of other potential stakeholders. A Project Management team has been appointed to help develop a robust business case for the project that will provide the key to securing a government grant of £1.56 million, although further funding will be required. The CCG's Head of Clinical Care has provided a letter of support for the proposed new Community Hall and Sports Pavilion project – acknowledging that it will form part of a proposed 'Health & Wellbeing' hub within the Town and will help support the local healthcare infrastructure in line with the increasing relevance of 'social prescribing' as a means of providing preventative health care.

FUNDING SUCCESS

Notice board

Grant funding was secured from Kent County Council via the KCC Member for Romney Marsh, Councillor Hills, for the purpose of purchase and installation of an additional Council Notice Board at the Princess Diana Memorial Gardens (Flagstaff Land), Littlestone Road. The Council is pleased to confirm that this new noticeboard has now been installed and will be in full use for the 2019-20 civic year and beyond.

The Town Council is committed to ensuring that information regarding the business of the Council is accessible to as many residents as possible, hence its use of its website and social media page as well as its three previously existing noticeboards to publish a wide range of information.

It was recognised that, for those residents without access to the internet, there was a significant distance between the notice board that is situated on the Greens in Littlestone and those that are situated in the Town Square and outside the Town Hall. Therefore, the Council hopes that the newly installed noticeboard at this midway point will 'bridge the information gap' by reducing the distance between which Town Council information is published.

Play equipment

As New Romney Town Council continues its programme of maintaining and improving play and leisure facilities for the children and young people of New Romney Town and Coast Wards, it can now confirm that a new two-bay swing set for New Romney's older children and teenagers, together with an interactive activity house for local toddlers and younger children have been installed during 2018 at Fairfield Road Recreation Ground.

• IMPROVEMENTS TO THE LOCALITY

New Romney Coastal Community Team - Helping to create a 'shore path to success'

New Romney Coastal Community Team ('NRCCT') was formed in 2017. It is a completely separate Forum from the Town Council. Its initial task was to develop a strategic Socio-Economic Plan for the area. This was completed in March 2017 and formally submitted to the Department for Communities and Local Government who had provided £10,000 grant funding for the Plan. (A further £5000 was also received from Magnox)

The Team is an 'enabling' forum. It has brought together a range of proactive local organisations who are committed to improving and regenerating the area. Members include the District & Town Council, the Romney Marsh Partnership, The Marsh Academy, St Nicholas Primary Academy, Littlestone Golf Club, the Varne Boar & Social Club, the Country Fayre Committee, Light Up New Romney, RNLI, New Romney Bowls Club, the Old School, Romney Marsh Visitor Centre and others. The Team held one meeting in January 2019 which enabled members to provide updates on the progress of the different projects that each organisation is leading on. For example, the Marsh Academy representative confirmed that funding for the 'Cinemarsh' project has been secured and the Academy is in the process of further developing and implementing the new cinema facility. Great news! Projects such as the new all weather bowling green at New Romney Bowls Club have been completed, and a range of smaller projects The District Council continues to lead on the development of a Job Generator hub at Mountfield Road Industrial Estate and with the endorsement of NRCCT applied for a Coastal Community Fund grant, which unfortunately, was not successful. A full analysis of the different projects is provided.

Importantly, the NRCCT will not 'lead' on any project, it does however provide an opportunity for members to have the endorsement of the Team which in itself, is evidence of support and engagement from a proactive cross-section of the local community, so helping each organisation to secure grant funding. If they are to be progressed, all major projects contained within the Plan will require a lead Partner and in the most part, will necessitate extensive public consultation and engagement

The Team's focus is encapsulated in the Plan's vision which states:

'New Romney will be a stronger and more dynamic hub of Romney Marsh; promoting and using its strategic location and unique range of shops, services and attractions to increase investment. It will provide a vibrant vocal point for those living, working and visiting the area'

IMPROVING LOCAL LEISURE FACILITIES AND BUILDING COMMUNITY SPIRIT Update on Progress with the new Community Hall and Sports Pavilion



The Council has continued to progress the development of the long-awaited new Community Hall and Sports Pavilion that will replace the old Maude Pavilion on Station Road Sports Ground. Working closely with a professional project management team the detailed design for the building has been finalised and agreed and reflects the feedback received during multiple public consultations regarding the project that have taken place during the past few years. In May 2018 – two public awareness events were held in the Assembly Rooms to inform and consult stakeholders and local residents. In August 2018, a major multi-

questionnaire consultation was distributed to every household and business in the Town and Coast Wards to assess ongoing support for the project and to consult local residents regarding the potential to take out a Public Works Loan to fund any potential shortfall and so ensure implementation of the project.

The new facility, together with the refurbishment of the adjacent old Boxing Club will cost just over £4 million. This will be funded by Town Council allocated reserves, the capital receipt from the sale of an adjacent parcel of land, VAT reclamation and grant funding. Any shortfall will be met by a low interest Public Works Loan (see above)

Following an Especial Meeting of Full Council in March 2019, a formal planning application has been submitted to Folkestone & Hythe District Council which includes both the Community building and a linked residential development. The capital receipt from the sale of the development land will provide the majority of the balance of funding required.

2018 Remembrance Day Commemorations

New Romney Town Council worked in close partnership, during 2018, with the New Romney Branch of the Royal British Legion and other local organisations, as a result of which, it was pleased to be able to announce a whole day of commemorative events to bring the local community together in remembrance and commemoration on 11th November 2018.



The Town Council, having already signed up to the Armed Forces Covenant earlierin 2018, pledged to participate in the **International WW1 Centenary Tribute:** 'Battle's Over'. As a result, the Town Council, working closely with the local branch of the Royal British Legion as well as New Romney Scout Group and TS Veteran Sea Cadets, planned a high profile day of events that focused on commemorating the centenary of the end of World War One in line with the National Tribute.

'Battle's Over' was an international commemoration marking 100 years since the guns fell silent at the

end of World War One and New Romney Town Council, together with the New Romney Branch of the Royal British Legion and others, played its part in these commemorations which took place around the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth.

Organised by Pageantmaster, Bruno Peek LVO, OBE, OPR, 'Battle's Over' took place on Sunday 11th November 2018 – with events throughout the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man and at scores of overseas locations, including New Zealand, Ireland, Australia, Bermuda, France, Belgium, Canada, the United States and Germany.



The Tribute began at 6.00am with over 1,000 lone pipers playing 'Battle's O'er' – a traditional Scottish Air played after a battle, outside cathedrals and at other individual locations throughout the country and overseas. In New Romney, the Air was sounded out at the Garden of Remembrance in Church Approach.



The annual RBL Service of Remembrance in the Parish Church was preceded by a full parade through the High Street commencing at West Street Car Park and proceeding to St Nicholas Church via Church Approach and was followed by the annual Burma Star Service at the Garden of Remembrance.

During the afternoon, a Remembrance Day Concert, performed by Kent Police Band, took place in the Church and the Old School, where an

appropriate history display had been prepared, was open for visitors.

At 6.55pm, buglers sounded the Last Post at more than 1,000 locations, where at 7.00pm WW1 Beacons of Light were lit in a tribute signifying the light of peace that emerged from the darkness of four years of war. New Romney Town Council is very grateful to Mr Del Jones (Principal Trumpet Player for Hythe Town Concert Band), who graciously volunteered to sound the Last Post at The Greens, Littlestone before New Romney's Beacon of Light was lit. During the Beacon-Lighting Ceremony on The Greens, messages from the armed services were



read as well as the 'Tribute to the Millions' and music was provided by the East Kent Piping Society and the TS Veteran Sea Cadets Band.

At 7.05pm, over 1,000 churches and cathedrals rang their bells as part of the 'Ringing Out for Peace' tribute organised in association with the Central Council of Bell Ringers, which represents 65 societies of ringers from the British Isles and Overseas. Whilst the Beacon-Lighting Ceremony proceeded at The



Greens, the Bells of St. Nicholas Church were heard ringing out across New Romney.

The Right Worshipful the Mayor of New Romney, Councillor Peter Coe, said: 'We are proud to have played a part in this historic international event to commemorate the centenary of the end of the Great War and to recognise the contribution and sacrifice made by the men and women from our own community.'

'There But Not There' Tommy

Alongside the commemorative events that took place in New Romney, the Town Council also, in 2018, supported the 'There But Not There' campaign in recognition of those that lost their lives in the Great War. New Romney Town Council, therefore, joined the Nationwide Installat ion to the Fallen, installing a life-size 'There But Not There' Tommy at the Garden of Remembrance in Church Road, New Romney, as a lasting tribute to the Fallen of WW1.



In addition to the installation of New Romney's own 'Tommy' at the Garden of Remembrance, New Romney Town Council celebrated the award of 6 Tommy silhouettes, funded by the Armed Forces Covenant Trust. The silhouettes were located in New Romney's churches during the 2018 commemorative services of remembrance,

The award was made under the Armistice and Armed Forces Communities programme, which makes awards to bring the communities together to remember and to think about the Armed Forces today.

The 2018 Town Service of Remembrance in New Romney truly served to bring the local community together; the parish church was packed with local residents joining together in remembrance and reflection and in 2018's very special centenary year commemorating one hundred years since the end of WW1, the service was all the more poignant. The Tommy silhouettes which joined the 2018 congregation — taking their place in the pews alongside members of our community — played an important role in providing a real focus on remembrance in an engaging and imaginative manner.

The Right Worshipful the Mayor of New Romney, Councillor Peter Coe, said: 'This project, which provided a moving focus for New Romney's remembrance in 2018 in the form of the Tommy silhouettes that were awarded to the Town by the Armed Forces Covenant Trust, was so important because it helped bring together the members of our community not only in remembering the tragedy of conflict but in learning the lessons that history has taught so that we can all endeavor to move forward together in harmony.'

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

2018/19 Budget Analysis

The Town Council's revenue budget for the year 2018/19 is on target to balance, with an anticipated expenditure and income, each comprising £309,507.00. The cost of New Romney Town Council's services for a Band D property for the financial year was £116.35 equating to £9.70 per month or £2.24 per week.

The Town Council's Precept for the year 2019/20 in the amount of £326,992.40 represents an annual cost of £118.51 for New Romney Town Council's services for a Band D property for the year – a total annual increase of £2.16 equating to an increase of £0.18 per month or £0.04 per week on the previous year.
