Having duly considered the Chairman's report and having re-affirmed the clear consensus that there was a clear need for a purpose built Health Centre, including CDC (Clinical Diagnostic Centre) for Romney Marsh, it was:

1. Notes the opportunity presented by the Government's Neighbourhood Health Service pilot and the £10 million funding allocated to East Kent as one of the first pilot areas.
2. Recognises the clear case for locating a Community Diagnostic Centre (CDC) in New Romney, in response to local health needs, transport challenges, and health inequalities across Romney Marsh.
3. Agrees that the establishment of a CDC in New Romney would strengthen the delivery of the Neighbourhood Health Service and provide measurable benefits to local residents, across the Marsh, through improved access to diagnostic services closer to home.

HEALTH CENTRE FOR ROMNEY MARSH

Summary of the FOLCA paper:

Colleagues,

This summary is about **fairness and access**, not opposition.

We welcome the progress being made on the new medical centre at the FOLCA building in Folkestone. It shows what can be achieved when the NHS, local partners and Government align behind a clear need.

But the purpose of this paper is to say, clearly and constructively, that **Romney Marsh faces healthcare challenges that are at least as great, and in many respects greater, and they now need the same level of strategic attention.**

Romney Marsh serves **25 to 28 thousand residents**, comparable to the population proposed for FOLCA. However, our population is **older**, has **higher levels of long-term conditions**, and lives across a **large rural and coastal area** with limited transport options.

The reality for many residents is stark:

- Journey times of **40 to 75 minutes** to acute hospitals,
- Over **70% of residents living outside the NHS 30-minute access benchmark**,
- Infrequent public transport, particularly evenings and weekends.

Unlike Folkestone, we have **no integrated healthcare hub**. Care is fragmented. Residents often attend a GP locally, diagnostics elsewhere, urgent care somewhere else again: multiple journeys for a single episode of care. This leads to delayed treatment, avoidable ambulance use, and pressure on A&E.

It's important to say this clearly:

FOLCA modernises existing urban provision. Romney Marsh requires additional provision.

What we are proposing is a **Marsh-based Neighbourhood Health or Integrated Community Health Facility**: bringing GPs, diagnostics, same-day urgent care and community services together under one roof. This would **complement**, not compete with, the Folkestone scheme.

Our ask is straightforward:

- That the ICB formally recognises Romney Marsh as an **area of priority need**,
- That officers work with local councils on a **Strategic Outline Case**,

- And that urban and rural schemes are progressed **in parallel**, ensuring balanced investment.

The evidence shows Romney Marsh is a **healthcare access cold-spot**, driven by geography, distance and demographics.

We are ready to work collaboratively to turn this from aspiration into delivery.

Briefing Note for Councillors:

Romney Marsh Neighbourhood Health Centre / Community Diagnostic Centre (CDC)

○ Purpose:

To summarise the case for locating a new Neighbourhood Health Centre, including a Community Diagnostic Centre (CDC), in **New Romney** to serve the whole Romney Marsh.

○ Context:

The Government's 10-Year Health Plan commits to moving care out of hospitals and into communities through Neighbourhood Health Centres offering diagnostics, urgent care, mental health and community services under one roof. East Kent is identified as a pilot area for this approach.

○ Why Romney Marsh?

- Romney Marsh is one of the most **isolated and underserved areas in East Kent**, with long travel times to hospitals and limited public transport.
- The area has an **older-than-average population** and a higher prevalence of long-term conditions such as diabetes, heart disease, COPD and frailty.
- These factors contribute to **missed appointments, delayed diagnosis and avoidable hospital admissions**, increasing pressure on acute services.

○ What is being proposed?

A modern, integrated Neighbourhood Health Centre on the Romney Marsh, providing:

- Modern GP facilities with same-day and digital access
- Urgent primary care, including evenings and weekends
- A local CDC "spoke" offering tests and scans (e.g. bloods, X-ray, ultrasound, ECG)
- Community mental health, rehabilitation, pharmacy and nursing services
- Space for voluntary and community wellbeing support
- Potential future development of a Minor Injuries Unit

○ Why New Romney?

- New Romney is the **natural civic and population hub** of the Marsh and the most accessible location for surrounding villages.
- It can serve a catchment of **25,000+ residents**, as well as seasonal visitors and the local workforce.
- Land has already been identified, and there is strong local leadership and cross-community support, reducing delivery risk.

○ Benefits for the wider system

- Faster diagnosis and treatment closer to home
- Reduced travel and fewer DNAs (Did Not Attend)
- Improved management of long-term conditions
- Reduced pressure on William Harvey Hospital and Folkestone Urgent Treatment Centre
- Direct contribution to tackling rural and coastal health inequalities

- **Key Ask**

That Kent & Medway ICB places a **Romney Marsh Neighbourhood Health Centre** on its capital pipeline and recognises New Romney as a priority site for delivering the Government's neighbourhood health model in East Kent.

What Councillors Are Being Asked to Support

- **In-principle support** for the development of a Neighbourhood Health Centre, including a Community Diagnostic Centre (CDC), to serve the Romney Marsh.
 - **Recognition of New Romney** as the most appropriate and accessible location for this facility, serving the widest Marsh catchment.
 - **Advocacy to Kent & Medway ICB and local MPs** to place the Romney Marsh scheme on the NHS capital pipeline as a priority project.
 - **Cross-council collaboration** (town and parish) to demonstrate unified local leadership and readiness to support delivery.
 - **Engagement with residents and partners** to strengthen the case and ensure the centre reflects local health and wellbeing needs

Integrated Care Board Summary Overview

“Colleagues, I want to be clear about where NHS power now sits, because this matters for our communities.

The Kent and Medway Integrated Care Board, the ICB, is now the body that decides what NHS services are provided, where they are located, and how funding is allocated across our area. Those decisions are no longer made by NHS England.

That includes GP services, community hospitals, urgent care, and diagnostic centres. In other words, if a service is missing locally, or being centralised elsewhere, the ICB is where that decision is happening.

The challenge for rural and coastal areas like ours is that ICB decisions are often justified on so-called ‘system efficiency’. Without strong evidence, communities with longer travel times, older populations, and poorer transport links can be overshadowed by urban demand.

Importantly, the ICB has a **legal duty** to reduce health inequalities. That includes tackling rural isolation, coastal deprivation, and the needs of ageing populations. Areas like Romney Marsh are not on the very edge of what is expected, they are exactly what this duty was designed to address.

The NHS now works on a place and neighbourhood basis. While town and parish councils sit outside formal NHS governance, this is where local influence is strongest, if we act early, speak with one voice, and present hard data.

Workforce shortages are often cited as a reason not to expand local services. If we want change, we must be ready with practical solutions: hub-and-spoke models; shared facilities; and system-wide benefits.

Finally, NHS England no longer decides where community services are built. It sets national rules and holds ICBs to account, but local decisions must go through the ICB first. Direct lobbying of NHS England rarely works unless that route has been fully exhausted.

The key message is simple: unified councils, strong evidence, and early engagement are what shift outcomes.”
